#### 1. The Constitutional Framework of US Government

(a) Explain why it is difficult to amend the US Constitution. [10]

(b) Analyse whether the US Constitution maintains an effective balance between the rights and powers of the federal government, and those of the states and citizens. [30]

# 2. The Legislative Branch of Government: the US Congress

- (a) Explain how 'pork-barrelling' affects the work of Congress. [10]
- (b) Assess the view that Congress is a powerful and effective legislature. [30]

#### 3. The Executive Branch of Government

- (a) Explain the role of the Executive Office of the President.
- (b) 'Recent presidencies have proved that the US president can make the office as powerful as he wants it to be.' Discuss. [30]

#### 4. The Judicial Branch of Government: the Supreme Court

- (a) Explain the factors a president will consider when nominating a Supreme Court justice for appointment. [10]
- (b) Given that the Supreme Court is not an elected body, analyse whether its role as guardian of the Constitution can be justified. [30]
