Amount and share of electricity produced from nuclear sources in the world, 1990–2013

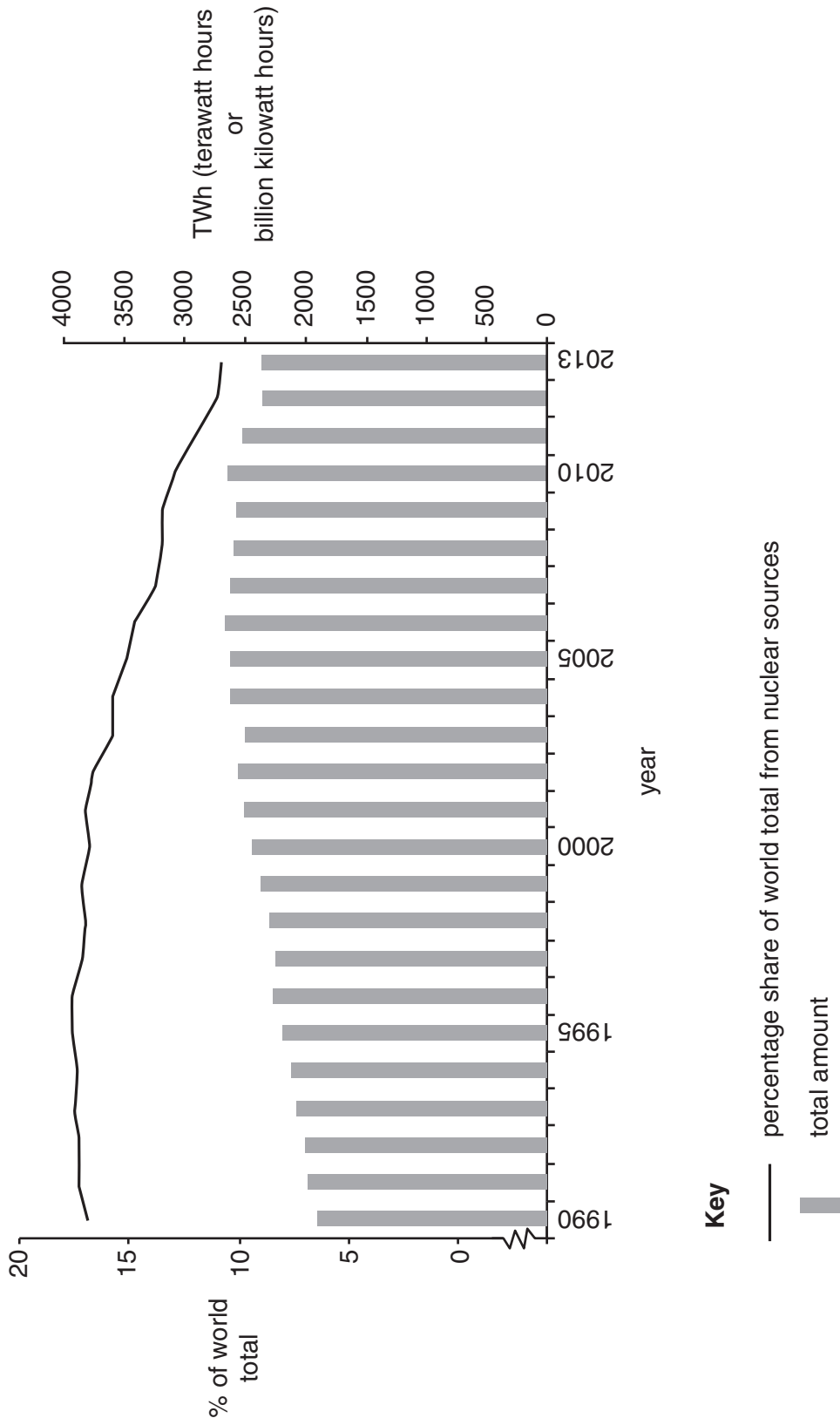
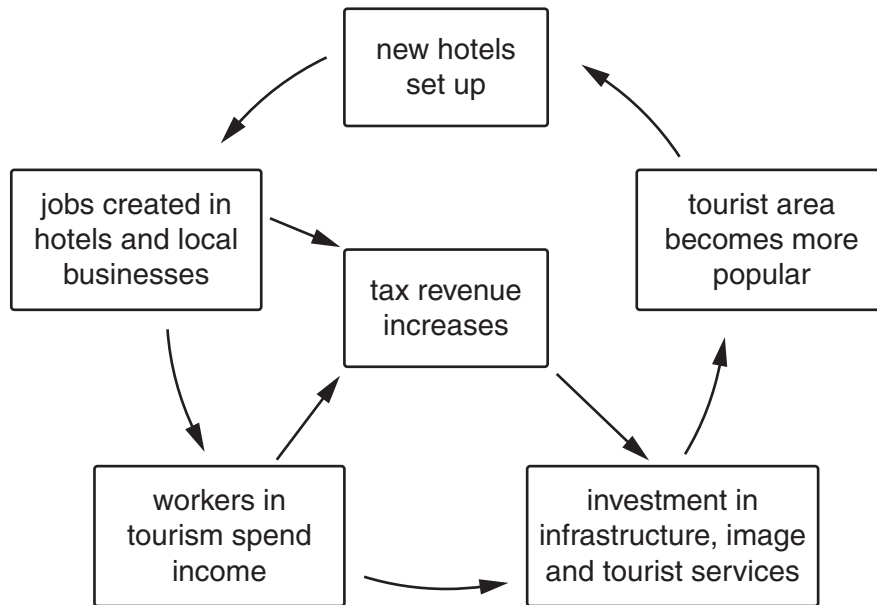

A model of the multiplier effect applied to tourism

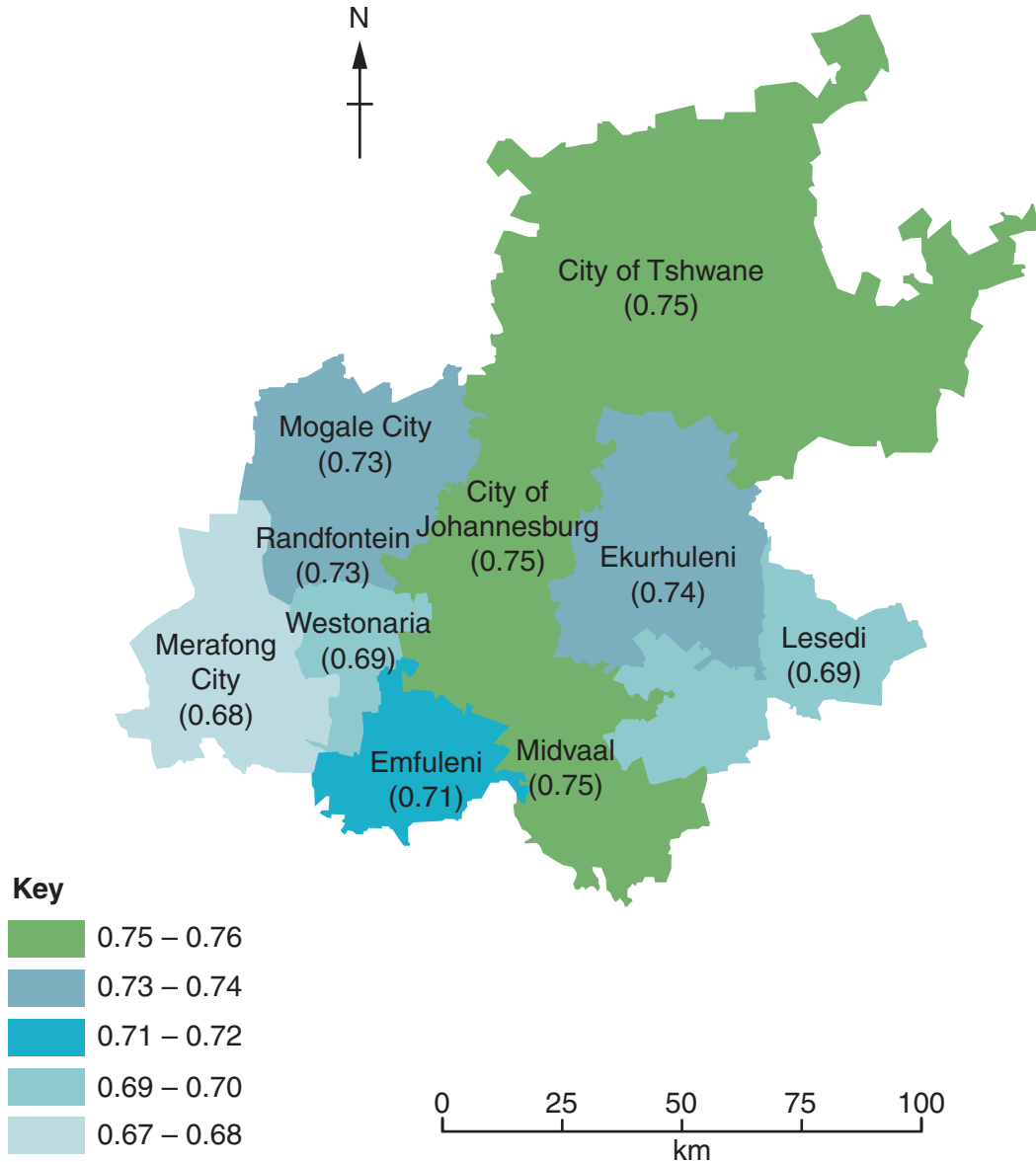
