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General Marking Guidance

• All candidates must receive the same treatment. Examiners must mark the first candidate in exactly the same way as they mark the last.

• Mark schemes should be applied positively. Candidates must be rewarded for what they have shown they can do rather than penalised for omissions.

• Examiners should mark according to the mark scheme not according to their perception of where the grade boundaries may lie.

• There is no ceiling on achievement. All marks on the mark scheme should be used appropriately.

• All the marks on the mark scheme are designed to be awarded. Examiners should always award full marks if deserved, i.e. if the answer matches the mark scheme. Examiners should also be prepared to award zero marks if the candidate's response is not worthy of credit according to the mark scheme.

• Where some judgement is required, mark schemes will provide the principles by which marks will be awarded and exemplification may be limited.

• When examiners are in doubt regarding the application of the mark scheme to a candidate's response, the team leader must be consulted.

• Crossed out work should be marked UNLESS the candidate has replaced it with an alternative response.

Question number	Indicative content
1	8 marks AO1 AO1 will be used by candidates to demonstrate knowledge, understanding and specialist language and terminology when responding to the question.
	 Candidates may refer to the following. Unity: the Church is Christ's mystical body and just as Christ cannot be divided neither can his body. There is one diverse Church. Holy: the Church participates in the holiness of God by expressing the divine life in doctrine, sacraments and service. Catholicity: The Church is the fullness of Christ's body on earth and thus the Christian faith is for all people. Apostolicity: The Church professes the faith taught by the apostles, the deposit of faith, which was entrusted to the Church by Christ. The Church may be viewed as an organism in which every member functions and associates with other members.

	AO1 will be used by candidates to underpin their analysis and evaluation. Candidates will be required to demonstrate knowledge and understanding using specialist language and terminology when responding to the question, and in meeting AO2 descriptors described below.
	 Candidates may refer to the following in relation to AO1. Most Christians express and declare their faith through hymns, songs and anthems.
	 Music creates atmosphere and enriches worship. Music may be a significant religious experience in itself.
	AO2 requires candidates to develop their answers showing analytical and evaluative skills to address the question. Such responses will be underpinned by their use of knowledge and understanding.
	 Candidates may refer to the following in relation to AO2. Music is important because some Christians find their closest experience of God through hymn singing. Music is important because anthems, hymns and spirituals clearly are things which give worship meaning. Music is an effective way to gain inner strength and inspiration for daily living, and as such has intrinsic value. Of all the art forms that may be employed in worship, music is especially corporate because it contributes in reflecting the 'togetherness' or 'community' aspect of worship. Candidates who show achievement only against AO1 will not be able to gain marks beyond the top of Level 1.

	The specification refers to the views of Luther and Calvin and these are used as exemplars.
	AO1 will be used by candidates to underpin their analysis and evaluation. Candidates will be required to demonstrate knowledge and understanding using specialist language and terminology when responding to the question, and in meeting AO2 descriptors described below.
	Candidates who assess only salvation or justification cannot normally proceed beyond Level 2.
	 Candidates may refer to the following in relation to AO1. For Luther justification is by faith alone (<i>sola fide</i>). Luther affirmed salvation by grace through faith. Calvin understood election to salvation as unconditional.
	AO2 requires candidates to develop their answers showing analytical and evaluative skills to address the question. Such responses will be underpinned by their use of knowledge and understanding.
	 Candidates may refer to the following in relation to AO2. In contrast, Luther rejected the Catholic doctrines of penance, indulgences and any other form of human merit as necessary for salvation. Controversially, Luther taught and believed that it is God's grace alone that forgives sins and imputes the righteousness of Christ to the one who believes. It can be argued that Calvin emphasised justification as a forensic act, whereby God declares the believing sinner righteous, an act made possible by the grace of God. For both Luther and Calvin, Christ's death is seen as substitutionary atonement.

4(a)	8 marks AO1 AO1 will be used by candidates to demonstrate knowledge, understanding and use of specialist language and terminology when responding to the question.
	 Candidates may refer to the following. One key feature is the deontological use of the Ten Commandments. The New Testament contains essential ethical teachings of Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount. A central Christian message from the Bible is to 'love your enemies and your neighbour as yourself'. St. Paul talks of love as being patient, kind and of envying no one. <i>Agape</i> is a key element of Situation Ethics. Christians should live a life that is understanding of others. Christians should follow the example of Jesus and live a life that involves self-sacrifice and service.

4(b)	5 marks AO1, 15 marks AO2
	AO1 will be used by candidates to underpin their analysis and evaluation. Candidates will be required to demonstrate knowledge and understanding using specialist language and terminology when responding to the question, and in meeting AO2 descriptors described below.
	 Candidates may refer to the following in relation to AO1. The Bible is the only book that some Christians call 'the word of God'. Some Christians believe that God guided the authors of the Bible to write down his will, word for word. The Bible is the primary source for Christian worship, beliefs and practices.
	AO2 requires candidates to develop their answers showing analytical and evaluative skills to address the question. Such responses will be underpinned by their use of knowledge and understanding.
	 Candidates may refer to the following in relation to AO2. Historically Christianity 'inherited' the Jewish canon and consequently Christians believe that God spoke through the Old Testament prophets and revealed his will also through the Old Testament. Christians consider that the developed Christian canon has led to the fact that both the Old Testament and New Testament are used within Christian liturgy today. The content of the Bible consists of a range of material such as law, prophecy, writings, history, poetry, gospels, letters, apocalyptic, parables and miracles, through all of which God reveals himself. There are different Christian attitudes to the Bible such as literalists, traditional approaches of divine inspiration and liberal approaches. Implications of some of these may be examined. Beliefs about the authority of the Bible within different traditions, for example, 'sola scriptura' during the Reformation, the importance of the Bible and tradition within the RC Church might be discussed. The Bible is believed by some Christians to be infallible and inerrant, by others as inspired literature and by others as merely ancient literature.

Judgements of a limited range of elements in the question are made. Judgements are supported by an attempt to appraise evidence (AO2).
Level 4	16-20	 A wide range of knowledge, specialist language and terminology are carefully selected and used appropriately, accurately and sustained throughout (AO1). Critically deconstructs religious information/issues leading to coherent and logical chains of reasoning (AO2). Makes connections between the full range of elements in the question (AO2). Constructs coherent and reasoned judgements of the full range of elements in the question. Reasoned judgements are fully supported by the comprehensive appraisal of evidence (AO2).

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
