Question 1

Study Sources A and B.

Source A: An illustration from 1570. It shows a man and four women who were burned to death in 1556 for refusing to follow the official religion in England.



Source B: From a government website about crime, 2012.

3 Why did the Bloody Code end in the mid-nineteenth century?

- 1815: Over 200 crimes were punishable by death.
- 1823: Gaols Act.
- By 1877, 90 new prisons had been built.

4 In what ways has the role of the police been affected by changes in technology since 1900?

(a) Describe the links between crime and the attitudes of society during the Roman period. (9)

*(b) How far was the Norman Conquest (1066) a turning point in crime and punishment? Explain your answer. (16)

You may use the following in your answer and any other information of your own.

- Mutilation was a common punishment in the Anglo-Saxon period.
- The Anglo-Saxons used a system of Wergild.
- Under the Normans, some criminals claimed Benefit of Clergy.

6 Changing views of the nature of criminal activity c1450 to the present day.

(a) Describe the treatment and punishment of someone accused of witchcraft in the seventeenth century. (9)

*(b) How different was the treatment of conscientious objectors in the First World War and in the Second World War? Explain your answer. (16)

You may use the following in your answer and any other information of your own.

- During the First World War, 'absolutists' were sent to prison.
- During the Second World War, 29,000 conscientious objectors worked in factories or on the land.
- During the Second World War, the government allowed the Peace Pledge Union to put up posters.
