Harm reduction and smoking: interviews and focus groups

Researchers from Edinburgh University wanted to explore how e-cigarettes/vaporizers are understood and experienced by smokers and recent ex-smokers. Smokers and recent ex-smokers (quit in previous 12 months) were recruited from a range of community and interest groups in disadvantaged areas. The research involved the collection of qualitative data. Twelve focus groups were conducted with different smoker groups. Eleven individual interviews were also conducted. The project focussed particularly on groups who may benefit most from tobacco harm reduction approaches.
