## **YOUNG PEOPLE AND POLITICS**

Researchers White, Bruce and Ritchie carried out a qualitative study with the aim of gaining an understanding of the reasons why so many young people seem to have very little interest in politics. They used FOCUS GROUPS to collect their data. After careful analysis of the data collected in the focus group sessions, they found that young people regarded politics as dull and irrelevant. The researchers also found that the young people had few opportunities to get involved in the political process and felt excluded from it.
