(a) Examine Sikh understanding of karma and rebirth. [15] 'The greatest influence on Sikh lifestyle is belief in karma.' (b) Evaluate this view. [15] Or, 4. Explain the concepts of Kirat Karo and Vand Chakko. [15] (a) 'Vand Chakko is more important in Sikhism than Kirat Karo.' (b) Evaluate this view. [15] Or, 5. Examine how the festival of Vaisakhi expresses Sikh identity. [15] (a) 'Sikh festivals are more social than religious occasions.' (b) Evaluate this view. [15]
